Becoming a Global Learner

Respecting the diversity among people and cultures is one the district's five strategic directions. Our new Service Learning program for 7-12th grade students, as well as the Department of Public Instruction Global Education Achievement Certificate (GEAC) for 9-12th grade students are two of many opportunities that align with this strategic direction.

Through the Service Learning Program, the district has made a commitment to expose students to different cultures and customs. In a global environment, it's critical to build a sense of understanding, respect and appreciation of people and cultures beyond our own. The Service Learning Program creates a safe, structured environment for students to be

introduced to many facets of diversity, both locally and internationally. Students will have the ability to immerse themselves in experiences which will instill values of commitment, service and compassion.

This summer, eight intermediate students will travel to the Dominican Republic with club advisor Staci Neidert for an environmental education service learning project. In addition, eighteen high school students will travel to Ecuador for service learning opportunities with advisors Jennifer Piorkowski, Emily Merritt and Danielle Chaussee.

MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Charting Our Course-Following the Strategic Plan

We have continued to focus on the District's facility needs. The community-based Facilities Advisory Committee (FAC) has been working since January 2015 to learn about the District's capacity issues, capital maintenance needs, and the future of classroom learning environments.

FOCUS ON:

STRATEGIC DIRECTION #4 - HIGH QUALITY FACILITIES WITH 21ST CENTURY LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS

GROWTH TREND

Based on community growth projections by MDRoffers & Associates, OASD is expected to grow by an additional 544 students by 2025. This growth follows an upward enrollment trend that brought more than 1,000 students to the OASD from 2005 to 2015.

In addition to capacity issues, the district has capital maintenance needs in some of our aging buildings. We have prioritized those needs, and identified as the highest priority those systems which are at or beyond their useful life.

OHS EAST CAMPUS/ WILKINSON PROPERTY

Last December, the School Board purchased the former Wilkinson Clinic property on Summit Avenue with the intention of renovating this space as an extension of the high school campus. We believe this is a cost-effective way to address the need for additional high school classroom space, while at the same time developing innovative instructional programs for our students.

Plans for the "East Campus" at the Wilkinson site will include integrated academic and school-to-career program options. Engineering and architecture, graphic design, business and marketing, and health sciences are some of the

high-skill and high-wage career pathways we're investigating. The district Teaching and Learning team began preliminary planning, working with faculty, and reaching out to potential community and business partners in anticipation of creating authentic, "real world" learning spaces at this new site.

COMMUNITY SURVEY

There is a summary of facilities needs and potential solutions in this newsletter. Look for a comprehensive District Facilities Survey to arrive in your mailbox this April. We encourage all residents to complete the survey! We will hold a community meeting in May to discuss survey results.

The FAC will evaluate survey results as it prepares a report and advisory recommendation for the School Board in June. The Board will then make a decision this summer regarding a potential facilities referendum as a part of the November 2016 general election.

These are your schools, and we have continued to work hard throughout the planning process to develop potential solutions that would not only meet our students' needs, but also make our community proud, all the while taking steps to reduce potential costs. Thank you for your continued support of our schools!

PLANNING FOR GROWTH

The school district began long-range planning discussions in the fall of 2014 to address three key challenges facing our community:

- ✓ Aging buildings with infrastructure needs
- ✓ School buildings that are over capacity at the Elementary and High School levels
- ✓ Enrollment growth total enrollment is projected to increase by 544 students by 2025



MEADOW VIEW ELEMENTARY

- Building was opened in 1962 as a Columban seminary for 150 men
- OASD purchased in 1974; it served the district well but was never designed to be an elementary school
- Over functional capacity today by approximately 75 students
- Approximately \$12.4M in capital maintenance needs
- Structural challenges (low ceilings, narrow classrooms, column locations)
- Two temporary trailers



IXONIA ELEMENTARY

- Built in 1956
- Additions in 1980, 1996
- Over functional capacity today by approximately 68 students
- Approximately \$3.8M in capital maintenance needs
- 4K and 5K classrooms on basement level with no windows
- Two temporary trailers



OCONOMOWOC HIGH SCHOOL

- Building opened in 1965
- Over functional capacity today by approximately 58 students
- Current enrollment: 1,575
- Ten-Year Projected Enrollment: 1,823
- Approximately \$11.6M in capital maintenance needs (roof, boiler, electrical)
- Cafeteria undersized for student population

Proposed Solution:

OHS Time Capsule Reveal April 22

OHS student Parker Ellis was looking through a 1965 yearbook and discovered a treasure. We have a time capsule at OHS! It was enclosed in the building's cornerstone at the dedication ceremony Nov. 14, 1965, the year OHS opened.

According to the old yearbook, the time capsule contains an early issue of the "Cooney Crier," an Elvis record, Beatles record, and a master plan of the building which called for an auditorium, swimming pool, and field house. Since 1965, OHS has grown by 600 students. In the next ten years, enrollment is expected to grow from 1,575 to 1,823 students.

A special event is planned for April 22 at 11:00 a.m. to open the 1965 time capsule, and replace the 50-year old artifacts with treasures from today. Perhaps an iPhone, or a Culver's menu will find their way into the cornerstone! Stay tuned for more details as we get ready to celebrate 50 years at OHS.





OHS Seniors Experience Reality Store

Seniors learned about the "real world" at the annual Reality Store event March 1. Reality Store is a financial simulation which mirrors real life. The goal is to help students understand what to expect in life after high school. Students chose an occupation with a corresponding salary, and were responsible for paying on student loan debt, taxes, housing and a vehicle. They kept a check register as they went through the stations to pay bills, buy insurance and shop for food. Recently established by the Wisconsin DPI, the GEAC program focuses and validates the excellent global education learning opportunities already in place at OHS, encourages students to enroll in classes with global content in the arts, sciences, and humanities, and prepares globally competent students who are career ready. The program requires four components: curriculum, cultural literacy, co-curricular and school sponsored activities, and a service learning project, all of which must have a global focus.



Smart Thinking: Focus on Math

As a district, we are moving toward common teaching practices in math. The objective is to make sure all students receive a similar approach to learning math, across all grade levels and in all buildings.

Last year, 7-12 math teachers received professional development in NCTM math teaching practices. This year, all 4K through 6th grade classroom teachers and learning strategists received professional development in NCTM (National Council of Teachers of Mathematics) High Leverage Mathematics Teaching Practices.

Teachers worked with a staff developer to better understand these math teaching practices, including how to:

- Establish mathematics goals to focus learning
- Implement tasks that promote reasoning and problem solving

- Use and connect mathematical representations
- Facilitate meaningful mathematical discourse
- Pose purposeful questions
- Build procedural fluency from conceptual understanding
- Support productive struggle in learning mathematics
- Elicit evidence of student thinking

What does this mean for elementary and middle school students? We want all students to be engaged in math, and feel confident in their ability to progress. "It's exciting to see teachers working together to determine lessons, discuss student work, and capture classroom lessons on video to present during professional development days, all with the ultimate goal of improving student achievement in math!" said Sarah Lang, OASD Coordinator of Elementary Education.
